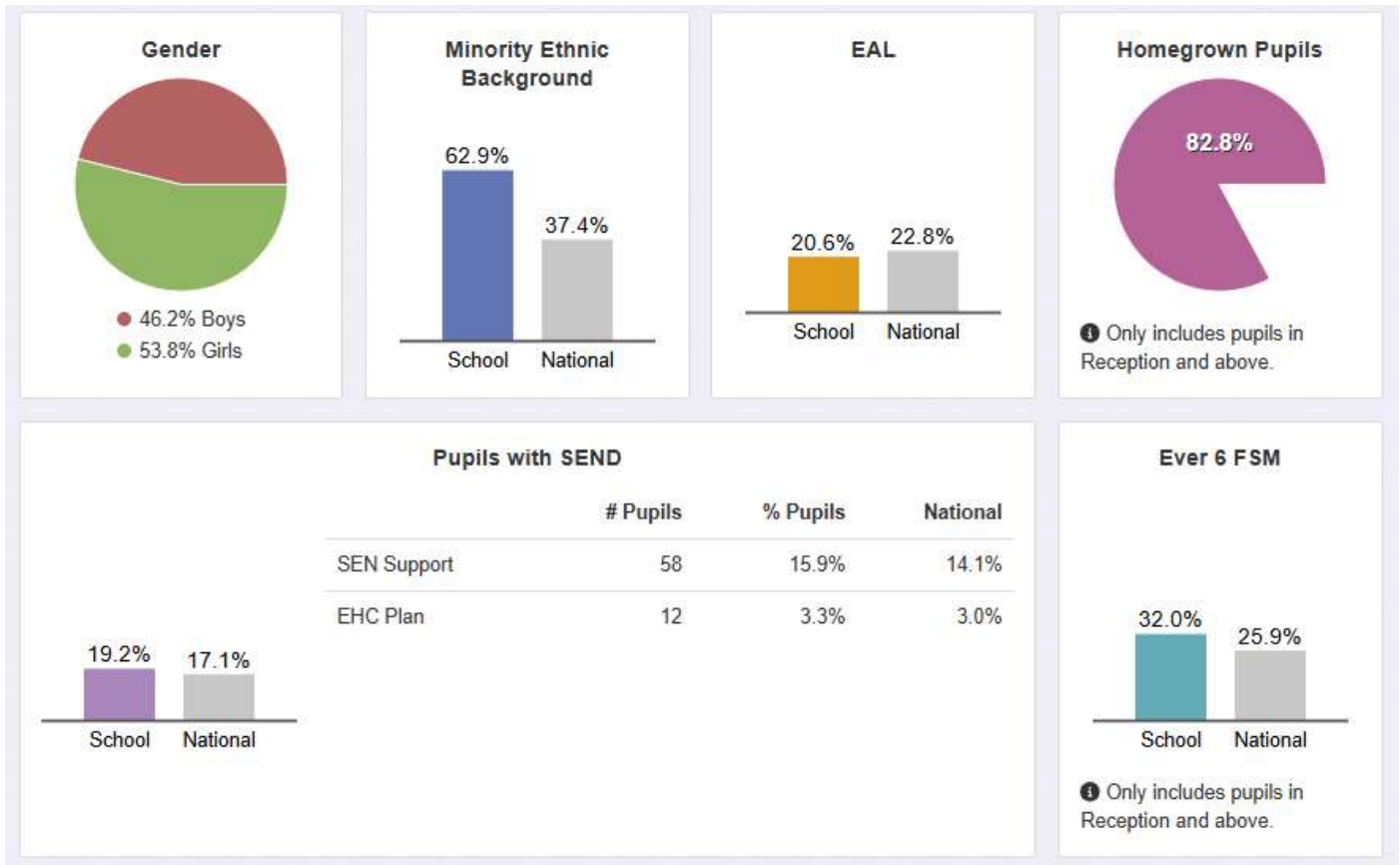
In order to ensure that all pupils are protected from discrimination, the school collects information on protected characteristics.
